Following a continental breakfast and raffle sales for baskets and wine brought by each of the clubs to raise money for the District 12 Scholarship Fund, Sharon B., from the host club, Royal Gorge, welcomed us and introduced the speakers.

Sheila Davis, District 12 Lt. Governor opened the program with remarks for both herself and Kay Meyer, District 12 Governor, who was unable to attend the meeting. As stand-in for Governor Kay she requested feedback on whether the district was meeting the needs of the individual clubs and what concerns or suggestions the individual clubs had for the district. As Lt. Governor she discussed her main role as head of the District Membership Committee and offered suggestions for recruiting and retaining members. She also reported on the district's progress in creating new clubs in Pueblo and Greeley.

Next each club shared their best ideas and greatest challenges. Interestingly, the successes and challenges were in the same areas: fund raising and membership recruitment and retention. Continued on page 2





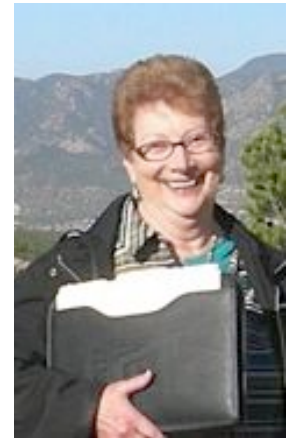
Zonta Area 4 Meeting continued

After a short break and an icebreaker activity, Dave Bergin, Deputy District Attorney in Pueblo and former bill drafter for the Colorado Legislature, spoke to us about the process state legislation goes through. In both the House and Senate a bill follows the same steps: first reading in committee, second reading at which time the bill gets debated and third reading at which time the bill either passes or dies. It is helpful to our advocacy efforts to understand this process and use it to follow a bill we want to support.

Mary Lou Edwards and Nikki Headlee, International Foundation Ambassadors, helped us better understand how the service funds we donate to Zonta International (ZI) are used by showing a short video on ZI's 2010-2012 service projects: Prevention of Mother-to-Child Transmission of HIV and Gender-based Violence in Rwanda, Elimination of Obstetric Fistula and the Reduction of Maternal and Newborn Mortality and Morbidity in Liberia, and Safe Cities for Women Project in Guatemala and El Salvador. Mary Lou and Nikki also discussed the 2010-2012 ZI Strategies to End Violence Against Women (ZISVAW) programs, which involve ending burn violence against women in Cambodia, Nepal and Uganda and ensuring gender-responsive recovery strategies in Haiti, all in cooperation with the United Nations Development Fund for Women (UNIFEM).

Before the final events of the day, we were treated to a Mexican buffet lunch. During lunch, we had a chance to visit and become better acquainted with each other.

The final speaker, Crystal Jonas, nine-time published author, image consultant and powerful motivational speaker held us all spellbound with advice on how to interest others in the Zonta cause by building confidence in ourselves and our ability to move others to action. This can be accomplished she said, by listening to and respecting others, then showing them how participation in our cause will benefit and enrich them. She laughingly warned us not to tell people what a lot of hard work Zonta requires and then expect them to dive in. The universe rewards recognizable results, not hard work, she said, so showing people the results of our efforts is the best way to motivate them to join us.



Our hosts wrapped up the activities by recognizing those attending an area meeting for the first time and drawing raffle tickets for the baskets and wine. Laura Stamp, Area 4 Director presented the organizers of the event, Janet Bergin and Sharon Brookins with potted columbines in the Zonta colors of mahogany and yellow.

As I walked out and looked "over the edge" with my Zonta sisters, I felt more like a winner and more ready to work for results. The meeting had inspired me. *-Pat M.*
