Domestic violence rates fell sharply
between 1993 and 2004, the Justice

Department said, noting that American Indian women and native Alaskan women are far more likely to be victimized than whites and other minorities. The Bureau of Justice Statistics said that "intimate partner violence" rates fell by more than 50%. The decline mirrored a decade-long trend in other violent crimes, and the department did not suggest a cause. "There's still generally no consensus about why any crime in general has dropped," said Shannan Catalano, the study's author said. "It's safe to say it's more than one factor that went into it."


