Club Address

Membership was up 37% with 26 members. There was a Membership Tea and a new broadened approach to recruiting by emphasizing International, District and Club activities.

Fund raising increased in all three areas. The Cripple Creek visit was up by 176% for a total of \$760. Nut sales increased 82% for a total of \$1.084. The Fashion Show showed an increase of 12% for a total of \$1.132. **Public Relations**

We held the first Educational Seminar on Women's' Rights and Responsibilities in the Workplace. There was more exposure than ever before - the Ute Pass newspaper, Gazette Telegraph and the Cheyenne Edition. We mailed / distributed over 700 fliers and promoted it at a local event, "The Collaboration Celebration." This also attracted two potential members. Our web site was developed and submitted to Zonta International for review. We developed a current local media list be used to publicize events

The Zonta banner was commissioned and used at club functions. New inserts with club information were

developed to fit into the ZI pamphlets.

E-mail addresses were added to our club roster and used to notify members of events and changes.

An International Women's Day celebration was heavily publicized resulting in a large attendance with standing room only. And, finally, monthly newsletters continued to be provided to members.

Status of Women

International Women's Day – a meeting open to the public was Russian style with an emphasis on the European approach, honoring women. We had a Zontian, a local educator, and two local poets. Reflections of a former peace corp volunteer were shared. Young Women in Public Affairs - our first ever award of \$500.

Women's' Rights and Responsibilities in the Workplace seminar was open to the public. October – our usual pot luck dinner where members bring a dish and recipe from another country. There were four speakers who were from and discussed current status of women in Iran, Nigeria, the Czech Republic, and the Slovak Republic. Service

Linen for Women - August Ice Cream Social donations for the Domestic Violence Safehouse. \$597 and 23 hours Adopt a Family – four single mom families that our club 'adopted' through EMS. Food and goods delivered to the families. \$1265 and 36 hours

YWPA - \$500 and 18 hours Educational Seminar - \$70 and 37 hours Nairobi Project – the Club collected and Karen P hand-delivered goods to a center for abandoned and orphaned children in Nairobi. The children are mostly refugees, abandoned young girls due to the wars in that area. WRA Mentorship Program - Through WRA our members support a woman selected by the agency in whatever way we can. International - of course, we gave our usual 1/3 to the Zonta Foundation.
