ZONTA EXCITEMENT AT THE COLORADO LEGISLATURE!

HJR 08 1009 'The CEDAW Resolution' by Betty E.

It was pretty impressive to see democracy in action at the State Legislature on March

7 – 10, 2008, with thanks to the Area 3 Zonta Advocacy Task Force in Denver!

The CEDAW (Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women) Resolution passed in the House on March 7, 43-21. It was tabled in the Senate on March 7, but the resolution passed on Monday, March 10, 19-15!

The main emphasis of this resolution is to show support for it, and to urge the United States Senate to ratify the Convention. Also, included in the resolution is the requirement that it be sent to the President of the United States, the Secretary of State, leaders of both houses, Chairman and members of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, and to each member of the Colorado delegation.

So, the State of Colorado joins more than 12 other states and territories as supporting CEDAW. There are other states who are on record as having either the Senate **or** House who have passed this type of resolution, but not both.

Meanwhile, back at the State House – the energies were high and one could see all the whispering Representatives, rattling of papers, and concerned faces on the 10-15 Zontians who were there. We were seated on the floor of both houses and could see all the things that go on – representatives walking around during the session, the line up of those waiting to speak for and against the bills, etc. Once the House vote was taken and it was announced that it had passed, the Zontians were elated and many of us

Things got confused in the Senate session and it finally was decided to table the vote until Monday. Several of us were unable to return to Denver on Monday and anxiously awaited the news. Almost couldn't believe it! There had been such negativity on Friday! But there it was - the Senate passed the resolution as well!

As reported by Kay Meyer:

"This summary really doesn't do justice to the drama. On the floor of both chambers, sponsors asked to be signed on & off, and there was passionate debate.

Zontians, this accomplishment on behalf of women is due to the *many* articulate & courageous messages that were sent to Legislators, and to some CO Legislators who literally 'stepped up to the plate' to defend CEDAW. Every one of you who took action can feel fulfillment in this.

Yes, this was just one step. The **US**Senate must still be convinced. If we don't let them (the US Senators) forget CEDAW, it will eventually come around. (I'm hoping sooner rather than later...) The resolution that passed today ensures that the US Senate & Administration will hear from the Colorado Legislature regarding this matter."



Zonta International Service Programs

Women's equality is not yet a reality. Women worldwide face systemized discrimination - they lack opportunities to live healthy lives, free from legal, social, economic and political inequality.

Zonta International empowers women to overcome barriers to their equal human rights through its International Service Projects funded by the Zonta International Foundation.

Since 1923, Zonta has provided more than US\$8 million to projects benefiting millions of women and their families representing 34 countries.

- * In sub-Saharan Africa, 57% of adults with HIV are women and young women 15 to 24 are more than three times as likely to be infected as young men.
- * Globally, more than 80% of women do not have sufficient knowledge about HIV/AIDS and many women do not have the power to say no to sex with an infected partner.
- * Every year an estimated 4 million women and girls are bought and sold worldwide.
- * In Bosnia, more than 10,000 victims of trafficking are in the country at one time.
- * More than 59 million school-aged girls are not in school and female illiteracy rates remain higher than men.
- * About 530,000 women die annually in pregnancy or during childbirth, mainly due to lack of access to health care.

Zonta International's Response CARE International Mata Masu Dubara (Women on the Move): Microcredit and Health Education for HIV/AIDS-Affected Women in Niger



Recognizing that HIV/AIDS and poverty are inextricably linked, CARE International is working to reduce the spread of HIV/AIDS while providing care and support for those affected, and to find lasting solutions to wider social and economic problems that exacerbate the AIDS crisis.

Through financial support from the Zonta International Foundation, the CARE project in the Bouza District of Niger will focus on reducing the risk of HIV/AIDS and its physical, social, and economic consequences for at least 5,100 women and their families in the Bouza District of Niger by the year 2008.

The project will provide HIV/AIDS education, self-esteem and negotiation skills training, and support networks of female peers, centered on the establishment of all-female savings groups.

Until there is a cure, strategies such as increasing women's income, status and decision-making power are the most powerful weapons in the fight against AIDS.
