

BUILD A BETTER WORLD FOR WOMEN AND GIRLS

Developing Future Leaders Through Scholarships and Award by Pat Meyer, Past President of Zonta Pikes Peak Part three of a series on ZI's five Biennial Goals

Number three of Zonta International's five Biennial goals for 2022-2024 is to Develop Future Leaders. For a peek into our club's efforts to meet this goal, we need to look at the Zonta International scholarship and award programs in which our club participates. One is the Young Women in Public Affairs (YWPA) award program which this year is a \$2000 award from our club and an additional \$1000 award from the district with an possible opportunity to compete for a \$5000 award from Zonta International. Eligible young women must be aged 16-19, study at a high school or college in a Zonta district, demonstrate evidence of active commitment to volunteerism, and have experience in local government, student government, or workplace leadership (paid or unpaid).

I recently had the good fortune to help choose a Young Women in Public Affairs Award winner for our Zonta PPA Club. Our committee was blown away by some of the applicants, but at the top of the list was a high school senior from Manitou Springs named Meghan Taylor. I am happy to say that she is our YWPA winner for 2024. I think you will be amazed, as we were, when I relate to you below some of her many accomplishments.

As President of her school's National Honor Society, Meghan led a civic action campaign for voter registration. The result: 86% of the senior class registered to vote. She is Vice President of her school's performing arts club (her passions are performing arts and public policy). Not only did she and others organize weekly meetings to engage students in the performing arts, but she also worked with other club leaders to set up school-wide events like organizing actors to run a school-wide drunk driving awareness event. Says Megan: "The most valuable thing about leading groups and organizing individuals in your school is learning the power of peer-to-peer work and interaction ... crafting that sort of rapport and culture with peers is my favorite thing about participating within my school."

Her school leadership activities are just the tip of the iceberg. Wait until you hear about her community involvement and leadership. She is one of only 40 youth across Colorado elected to the Colorado Youth Advisory Council (COYAC) for working on legislative efforts to run through the state congress. She is the Vice-Chair of the Gender-Affirming Care Committee and on the council's executive board. And, get this, she was the main author, researcher, and stakeholder outreach for current Colorado House Bill HB24-1039, concerning non-legal name changes for transgender youth. She states: It has been surreal to have watched this bill ... go from something I wrote on my laptop to the House." In a letter of recommendation, the director of the Youth Advisory Council writes: "...Meghan served on a state legislative committee as one of seven COYAC members to present ... recommendations to legislators. She prepared talking points, analyzed what people might say to oppose her policies, and presented better than most adult policy professionals"; "During the public hearings for [this] bill, Meghan remained composed amidst hateful rhetoric by people testifying." Meghan also serves as the only youth in Colorado on the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment Suicide Prevention Commission as a commissioner. She serves as Co-Chair on the commission branch called Youth Specific Initiatives, working on creating policy

Here are some of the things Meghan had to say about the status of women in our country. "...women are not liberated in my country until there is equality, and when no woman has to walk with one earbud out, look constantly behind them on the sidewalks, or carry pepper spray to their place of employment. The best thing to do for these things is to raise young men who are aware of women's issues and rights and ensure that people can realize that women's empowerment does not mean less for men, but more for everyone. Unfortunately, as I have realized through my work in policy, you cannot legislate acceptance. You cannot turn so easily the tide of opinions and traditional societal roles, so we start at the top at the most basic starting point and work down from there."

recommendations concerning the intersection of youth and suicidality.

Awarding this young woman the YWPA Award is more than a privilege; it gives us a sense of empowerment ourselves to bring forward such a powerful advocate for social change, helping to attract and speak to the next generation of women leaders. The best part is that we will be able to meet her and congratulate her at our May Awards Dinner. Be sure to let her know how much we appreciate her as a future (and

present) leader.

Did you know? In addition, we send funds towards Amelia Earhart Fellowship for women pursuing Ph.D./doctoral degrees in aerospace engineering and space sciences, which is only granted at the international level, as well as help fund the Karen Possehl Women's Endowment (KPWE) for non-traditional students at UCCS, as well as serve as mentors for these students.

Promoting girls' education, the inclusion of climate literacy in schools, and girls' participation in STEM studies to increase gendered scientific and technical contributions to climate change mitigation.

Advocating for national policies that consider women's economic opportunities and ensure their full and equal participation in the economy.

Everyone in the Springs and nearby areas is invited to help us with our April project, in collaboration with the Woman's Club of Colorado Springs!

Goals: To recycle thin plastics (see attachment for examples) To increase awareness about thin plastics, and the harm they cause to our environment, and to reduce our dependency on them

How to help:

You'll need to weigh your plastics and email your totals each time you turn them in. You can weigh them at home or in the produce section at the store before turning them in. Email us at this <u>LINK</u>.

When you take your bag of plastic sheeting into King Soopers, you can put it next to the box that most locations have for recycling plastic bags. If you don't see that recycle box, please take your bag to Customer Service. It's not necessary to write WCCS on it. The way we get credit is for you to email us the following information:

Your name The date The weight of your plastic(s) The location (which King Soopers - street name is fine)

See examples of thin plastics in the image below. When we reach our goal, a third bench will be added to a location chosen by the Woman's Club of Colorado Springs!

Note: This is a year-round plastics drive - Please keep us in mind in the months ahead!






